This course will provide a survey of jazz music, its history, and its social contexts. This will include a study of major figures within the jazz tradition and the development of various jazz styles. The course has three areas of pedagogical focus: 1) historical, 2) theoretical, 3) experiential, and will incorporate weekly interactive lectures, readings and listening examples. Emphasis will be centered on historical and analytical perspectives that focus on narratives and histories "from below," that is, on the (often contradictory) relationships of jazz history to subaltern social movements involving issues of class, race, and gender.
