## Western University Don Wright Faculty of Music Department of Music Research and Composition MUSIC 3610A – Modal Counterpoint I Fall 2023

#### **Course Information:**

This course will develop writing skills through written two- and three-part exercises in species and free counterpoint following the style of Palestrina. It will culminate in the composition of motets and/or mass movements.

Analysis appropriate to the above studies will be undertaken in class and on some assignments. However, writing skills – not analytical skills – are the explicit focus of the course.

#### **Requirements:**

- 1) Completion of preparatory listening, reading or score study exercises using online modules in OWL;
- 2) Regular participation is required, including contributing to classroom discussions, completion of in-class practice exercises, and participating in group singing of examples.
- 3) Bring manuscript paper, pencils and eraser to every class for the purposes of note-taking and completing practice exercises.
- 4) Ten (10) weekly written assignments, with opportunities for revision and resubmission of exercises for improvements in grade. See Assignments handout.
- 5) Take-Home Exam/Final Project.

#### **Participation Exercises:**

- These will be completed and submitted online and/or in person in advance of and during class times.
- They will be graded for participation only, and not for achievement.
- There will be approximately 30 of these exercises, and a perfect score can be achieved by completing 75% of the total number (approximately 22)

#### **Procedures for Assignments:**

- Assignments should be scanned and submitted through the online assignments tool in advance of
  the due date and time listed there and referenced in the attached schedule. Assignments handed in
  late will only be graded if prior accommodations have been requested and approved, though
  students may still request feedback on their work if submitted late.
- All assignments are to be written by hand, in open score, using the old clefs and other notational conventions explained during the course. Electronic submission will be achieved by scanning work that has been completed by hand.
- Conformity to the technical features of Palestrina's music, as applicable within the confines of each exercise, is the primary measure of success in the assignments. Secondary to this, but still very important, are the creativity, musicality, and/or sensitivity with which those features are deployed.
- See the Assignments handout: There are systematic opportunities to revise and improve submitted work.

#### **Take-home Exam:**

The final project for the course will involve the composition of a motet or mass movement in two or three voices (or four voices, at the discretion of the instructor in consultation with individual students). The structural model for two-voice works will be the *Cantiones Duarum Vocum* of Orlando di Lassus, and for three-voice works the model will be isolated mass excerpts from Palestrina and/or Lassus. Preparatory work will be completed as part of assignments, with optional individual meetings to discuss work-in-progress. The final project will be due during the exam period, on a date to be assigned by the Registrar's office.

#### **Texts:**

There is no required text for this course. Necessary materials will be posted to OWL and concepts will be introduced through these materials and lectures. That being said, the following texts provide useful information and have been left on reserve in the library.

The student will also find the complete works of Palestrina, available at **M3.P345**, indispensable. This is a non-circulating book, so has not been placed on reserve.

Other scores, recordings, articles, and/or book chapters may be placed on reserve from time-to-time.

#### **Notes:**

- i. The prerequisite for this course is Music 2651A/B or the former Music 2650A/B. Unless you have either the prerequisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enrol in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.
- ii. **Grading scale:** A+=90-100%, A=80-89%, B=70-79%, C=60-69%, D=50-59%, F=0-49%.
- iii. Academic Consideration for Student Absence & Missing Work (≥10%): Students are responsible for making up any missed classes or assignments as soon as possible. The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet their academic responsibilities may, on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), or it may be chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. It is the assumption of this course that the thoughtful attempt, in written assignments, to apply the concepts studied in class is critical to the understanding of those concepts. Thus careful completion of the assignments and study of the instructor's comments on written work will prove a valuable resource. It should then go without saying that all work must be done independently.
