MUSIC 3735B - SONGWRITING I

INSTRUCTOR

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Songwriting is a skill developed through practice. To develop better songwriting skills the best option is to consistently be creating and capturing content that can then be worked into song. This can include musical elements such as melodies, countermelodies, bass lines, rhythms and lyrics that can be arranged with instrumentation and form. In this class we will be approaching songwriting from a practical approach. You will be asked to write and create during class time as well as outside of class. We will be exploring different forms of songwriting as it pertains to different genres as well as for radio and commercial use. There will be collaborative assignments where you will be working with another classmate to write and create a song. During class time you will be expected to perform your work for your fellow students as well as respect the space and time of the work of others.

ASSIGNMENTS

You will be required to submit 5 separate song creations:

JAN 22 - Lyrics only (unless you choose to add music) FEB 5/7/9 - Observational Song - No lyrics required MAR 4/6/8 - Co-writing Part 1 MAR 11/13/15 - Co-writing Part 2 APR 1/3/5 - Personal Reflection

The dates above are the due dates. You will need to sign up for one of the dates for the performance of your song. A schedule for performance dates will be put in place using OWL and in class time.

GRADING SCALE

- 15% Attendance (If a lecture or class time is missed due to illness, I require notification by email. There will be an allowance of 1 missed class to grant you perfect attendance.
- 10% Graded for each song completion on time. There are 5 songs to be completed. This means you will receive 50% in the course for submitting all of your 5 pieces on time. (If a song is late but still submitted you will receive 7%)
- 7% The remaining grade will include 7% <u>for each song</u> and will be calculated on collaboration and demonstration of effort and skill building.

UNIVERSITY POLICIES

Course Prerequisites: Music 1730A/B Unless you have either the prerequisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

2. At least three days prior to the deadline for withdrawal from a 1000- or 2000-level course without academic penalty, students will receive assessment of work accounting for at least 15% of their final grade. Generally, students can expect some form of feedback on their performance in a course before the drop date. In rare instances, at the Dean's discretion, an exemption can be issued, which also must be noted in the course syllabus. In rare instances and at the Dean's discretion, other courses could receive a similar exemption, which also must be noted in the course syllabus. Deans should review exemptions on a course-by-course basis each time an exempted course is offered. Performance-based courses in the Don Wright Faculty of Music are exempt (1900-1999, 2900-2999).

3. Grading scale: A+=90-100%, A=80-89%, B=70-79%, C=60-69%, D=50-59%, F=0-49%. For undergraduate programs at UWO, the following Senate-approved definitions apply:

A+ 90-100 One could scarcely expect better from a student at this level

A 80 - 89 Superior work which is clearly above average

B 70 - 79 Good work, meeting all requirements, and eminently satisfactory

C 60 - 69 Competent work, meeting requirements

D 50 - 59 Fair work, minimally acceptable

F. below 50 Fail

4. Academic Consideration for Student Absence and Missing Work greater than or equal to 10% Students are responsible for making up any missed classes or assignments as soon as possible. The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet their academic responsibilities may, on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), or it may be chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. Academic Consideration provides students with consistent, fair, and pedagogically appropriate consideration, without compromising the academic integrity of the course or program, when they have been unable to complete some component of a course due to short-term extenuating circumstances. Students who have long-term or chronic medical conditions (physical or mental) that may impede their ability to complete academic responsibilities are directed to seek Academic Accommodation through Accessible Education (Academic Accommodation for Students with Disabilities). Documentation shall be submitted, as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours after the end of the period of absence covered, to the Academic Counselling unit or Office of the Associate Dean, Undergraduate (TC210), of the student's Home Faculty together with a request for relief specifying the nature of the academic consideration being requested. Whenever possible, students who require academic consideration should provide notification and documentation in advance of due dates, examinations, etc. Students must follow up with their professors and their Academic Counselling office in a timely manner.

5. Academic Consideration for Student Absence & Missing Work less than or equal to 10% In cases where students miss work that is worth less than 10% of the total course grade due to medical illness or compassionate grounds, you will have no more than 2 weeks to complete a missing assignment. Students who have been denied accommodation by an instructor may appeal this decision to the Associate Dean's office but will be required to present appropriate documentation.

6. Statement on Academic Offenses

Submission of work with which you have received help from someone else (other than the course instructor or TA) is an example of plagiarism, which is considered a major academic offense.
